

The purpose of the first paragraph is to reveal stats and quotes from mainstream sources about the growing struggles teens may have regarding each topic. The purpose of the second paragraph is to reveal God's perspective by seeing what the Bible says regarding each topic and how we can receive help and guidance in our life's purpose through a relationship with Jesus.

IDENTITY

Identity is defined by Psychology Today as the knowledge of who we are¹. 63% of teens say they "know who they are" while 37% do not fully know their identity yet³. Teens may search for identity in status, work, race, ethnicity, education, family, opinions of others, religion, sexual orientation, gender identity, friends, money, power, talent, etc. Technology and social media may prove finding identity even more confusing and difficult, giving us more possible versions of "self" than ever before⁴ to constantly edit⁵, and an endless supply of people to compare ourselves with⁴. We may risk a vicious cycle⁸ of seeking constant online approval, causing unhealthy online dependency or a misconception that online identity equals real life⁴.

The Bible says our identity is found in God because we're created in His image (Gen. 1:27). Before we were born, He knew us (Jer. 1:5) and had plans written for us (Ps. 139:16). Jesus said we find our true life if we give ours to him (Luke 9:23-25), making us children of God (John 1:12) with a new life (2 Cor. 5:17) and relationship with Him (1 Cor. 6:17) through identity in Jesus (Gal. 3:26-28) and citizenship in our home, heaven (Phil. 3:20).

STATS & QUOTES TO CONSIDER

"Identity is the knowledge of who we are" says Psychology Today.

Imom.com says teens search for identity in a variety of things such as status, family, rebellion, people's opinions, idols, cliques, etc.

Who am I? why am I alive? What's my purpose? What's the meaning of life?

63% of teens say they "know who they are" while 37% do not fully know their identity yet.

Social media allow kids to broadcast everything while connecting them to experiences they might not have encountered a generation ago. But it also opens teens up to exponential ridicule or an amplified feeling of invisibility that can influence the perceptions they have of themselves.

"Kids are always looking at each other, comparing themselves to each other. The same thing that's going on in the halls is going on online," Steiner-Adair said. "The difference for teenagers today is that there's an endless supply of people to whom they can compare themselves."

Experts like Steiner-Adair and Dr. David Greenfield say the fact that many teens view their online and real-time identities as identical can be a recipe for disaster.

"Kids spend a lot of time crafting this identity that you hope people will respond favorably to," Steiner-Adair said. "When they feel desperate for feedback or curious in a risky way, social networking sites play very much on the vulnerability of teens' and preteens' desire to not only know what people think of them but their hopes that they're seen as cool and their hunger for approval."

Technology can also make it more difficult to form an identity. There are more versions of "self"

than ever before, which gives kids who may already be struggling to figure out who they are even more to juggle.

The natural urge to seek approval online can create a dependency on the Internet, Greenfield said. Because teens are digital natives, they have a higher likelihood for addiction. He says you can see it in the way teens handle their cellphones.

"The phone is so much more than a way of communicating," Greenfield said. "They would no more be out and about without a phone than they'd go without underwear. It's become part of their identity on a social and cultural level."

Pruning and revising profile content is an important part of teens' online identity management.

- 59% have deleted or edited something that they posted in the past.
- 53% have deleted comments from others on their profile or account.
- 45% have removed their name from photos that have been tagged to identify them.

- 31% have deleted or deactivated an entire profile or account.
- 19% have posted updates, comments, photos, or videos that they later regretted sharing.

The development of identity, or one's sense of self, occurs throughout a lifetime. For teens, thinking about their identity is a first-time event. They are starting to wonder who they are and why. They're curious about the factors (reasons) they are who they are. Teens are also developing a perception of themselves and wondering how others perceive them.

Teens will find themselves acting differently according to the situation and who's with them. This often leads to confusion and questions about who they really are.

Teens work out who they are by trying on new identities and experimenting with different appearances or new interests.

Every teen, including the one in your life, wants to discover their own secret identity.

One of the hardest problems most teens deal with is being judged by others. Feeling accepted matters more to teens than almost anything else.

The shaping of self-identity in teens is one of the most important and most vulnerable processes of our lives. The self-identity that we build during the adolescent years follows us into adulthood, which makes it an extremely critical period of time. Social media could be negatively affecting it, though.

If self-identity in teens is based on how many “likes” you receive on a post, then there’s always going to be someone who has more, and for that person, there’s always going to be someone who has more, and so on. It’s a vicious cycle that makes absolutely no sense.
